Homi Bhabha's Concept of Hybridity By Nasrullah Mambrol on April 8, 2016 • ( 12) One of the most widely employed and most disputed terms in postcolonial theory, hybridity commonly refers to the creation of new transcultural forms within the contact zone produced by colonization. As used in horticulture, the term refers to the cross-breeding of two species by grafting or cross-pollination to form a third, 'hybrid' species.
